



how to buy a standard stroller

Standard strollers carry kids from birth until they're too big or old for a stroller – typically around age 3 or 4.

Some standard strollers can carry an infant car seat – a great convenience with a newborn.

Most standard strollers have a comfortable seat that reclines for infants, a canopy, and a basket.

what to look for when buying

Safety standards: Look for Juvenile Products Manufacturers Association (JPMA) certification on the stroller or packaging.

Handle height: Handles should be at your waist or slightly below. Adjustable handles are helpful for parents of different heights.

Canopy: An adjustable shade protects your child from sun, rain, and wind.

Adjustable seat: A fully reclining seat (or the ability to hold a car seat) is a must for newborns.

Easy to clean: Removable fabric makes cleanup easier.

Maneuverability: You should be able to push the stroller in a straight line and turn it with one hand. Wheels that swivel make it easier to turn.

Stability: Make sure the stroller frame locks into position. This prevents it from collapsing accidentally with your child in it.

Storage: An under-seat basket is a must for most parents.

Brakes: Brakes should be easy to use. When the brakes are engaged, the wheels should lock.

Harness: The safest option is a five-point harness.

Extras: Helpful features include cup holders, a reversible seat, and an organizer pocket or tray.

what to avoid

Strollers you can't handle: Ask before buying: Will the stroller fit in your car? Can you fold and lift it up stairs or into a car?

Pain-inducing parts: Fingers and toes can get cut on sharp edges, caught in metal parts, or pinched by exposed springs.
